Photo #1 German Weapons

The JagdPz IV tank was used by the Germans to try to break through the Allied lines in December 1944. In English this tank is called the "Hunter Tank," and was used by the Germans from 1942-1945. U.S. Army Photograph

Between Eupen and Bütgenbach, Belgium, patrols search the woods for German paratroopers who were dropped in that area. Allied intelligence reported that there were many more German paratroopers in the area than were actually present. Searching for non-existent German paratroopers delayed the American response. 17 Nov 44

Supply movement is always a difficulty in war, but the snow and ice make it particularly complicated at this time. U.S. Army Photograph

Photo #9 Bütgenbach- Tank at Command Post

Dec 44

Dom Butgenbach, Belgium

1st Battalion, 26th Infantry, 1st Division

The left side of the photo shows one of the tanks forfeited by the Germans when they tried to break through American lines in Belgium. The U.S. medium tank in the center of the photo guards the sector against further attempts at a breakthrough by the Nazis.

In the military, your command post being overrun by the enemy is a sure sign that the battle is not going well for you. This is a picture from Bütgenbach where LT Daniels' command post was overrun three times. Each time the command post officers and cooks grabbed whatever they could find and repelled the German tanks.

The rubber tires on the jeep would get slashed by broken glass and other debris on the roads. The weasel was much more effective, but only one weasel was issued per battalion.

(It is on tracks instead of tires, lightly armored, can fit multiple people on stretchers, etc.) What would you do if you were driving the weasel for your battalion and there were injured men in company A, B, and C? How would you choose were to go first? How would you feel about making that kind of decision?

Photo #14 Environment/ Equipment

30 January 45

F. Moore of Lindale, Texas is examining a recaptured 2 1/2 ton trunk in Muringen, Belgium. The town was retaken by the 26th Infantry, 1st Division.

This row of flats in Liege, Belgium, was destroyed by German flying bomb V-1.

This is a photograph of Belgian refugees. When you look at these pictures of destroyed towns in Europe it is important to remember that people had lived in these towns. War is not just two forces clashing on a battlefield. The "battlefield" was someone's barn, farm, or neighborhood. Sometimes before a battle locals are given an hour to gather their things and get out of town before their neighborhood becomes a war zone.




