

## Life Is Made Easier for Disabled Veterans by Chicago Red Cross

Chicken dinners that will not soon be forgotten, ice cream, home made cakes, fresh eggs and fresh fruit were distributed to 291 wounded soldiers in Chicago contract hospitals during 1923, according to a report just submitted to the headquarters of the American Red Cross by Mrs. F. W. Upham, chairman of the local volunteer service. Two thousand glasses of jelly and many packages of cigarets comforted the soldier patients throughout the year.

More than 4,000 Chicago women took part in the year's work.

Through the efforts of the volunteer service department refugees in Smyrna and Japan were given relief. Comfort kits were sent to soldiers in service at foreign posts, were distributed to ex-service men in Chicago hospitals, and to former soldiers in hospitals throughout the United States.

More than 5,000 hours of clerical work were performed by the volunteers, one worker averaging four days a week during eight months. Among the women who aided in this department were Mrs. William E. Dever, Mrs. Emma Pfister, Miss Edith Packard and Mrs. E. G. Ince. Motor service performed by the volunteers averaged 100 miles a month.

Forty-nine hours a month were contributed to home service. Ninety-five hours a month were contributed to hostess and recreation work, and volunteers engaged in health aid worked sixty-four hours.
